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William Wilson '20 Scholarship endowed

Bill Wilson was a loyal Deke from the day he pledged in 1916 until the very day he died on April 9, 1997, when he asked about the undergraduates, The Temple and The Pierce Memorial.

That's 81 years of hard work, joyous and, yes, some turbulent times. Colgate and Mu were intertwined, both were first and what benefited one helped the other. He believed in God, but Colgate was his religion. We received the following shortly after his death from Gary Ross:

"If there was anyone who exemplified the spirit that is Colgate, it would have been [Brother Bill Wilson]. His energy and enthusiasm served as an inspiration for us all. I also know lwill never meet another person who spanned more easily so many different generations of Colgate people."

All other fraternities were important, as well as the college, and he gave them his support, especially after World War II, at a time when they almost disappeared from the campus.

He served the Mu of DKE Alumni Corporation as a Director for decades and as its Secretary-Treasurer before, during and after World War II. He was a Trustee Emeritus of The Mu of DKE Foundation. He attended our annual meetings and visited the House on a regular basis.

The Dean of Fraternities and Sororities reported earlier this year that Mu's cumulative grade point average is 3.04. Also that the GPA for Mu in the spring semester 1997 was a 3.167. Brother Blackmore has doublechecked the figures and was informed that they both are correct! Academic performance at this level deserves and justifies our support.

The cost of construction and equipment will be between \$30,000 and \$40,000.
